Taking Student Learning Outcomes Into the Fire

Instructors at the CHC Fire Academy have a new firefighting tool—an electronic assessment that ensures that cadets are getting the training they need.

On Friday, October 30th, cadets in the 71st CHC Academy were evaluated to determine their readiness to enter the firefighting profession, and as a means of assessing student learning outcomes (SLOs). By assessing in his manner, the faculty is able to review cadet performance and improve the quality of the program for future classes in the academy. The CHC Fire Academy has made excellent use of eLumen Achievement Software, and specifically, the eLumen Portable Scoring System.

Crafton is one of about 23 California Community College campuses that have adopted eLumen. But it is one of only two campuses in the nation that currently uses the eLumen portable scoring system that allows instructors to take the assessment out of the classroom and into the field.

"eLumen has been a god-send in making the task of assessing and managing all the SLO data very easy and manageable," said CHC Chief Dan Sullivan. "We used to spend hours and hours going through reams of scoresheets and tallying results. eLumen now does all that work instantly for us, so we can spend more time focusing on the quality of our academy, and giving our cadets the best experience anywhere."

"I didn't know much about SLOs and what they were all about, but eLumen has made the whole process easy for us. Having our SLOs and performance standards in the Toughbook out in the field makes it a nobrainer," said Instructor Mike Horton. "We can look at how our current academy compares with past performance with just a couple of mouse clicks, and that helps us see if we're on the right track."

Taking Student Learning Outcomes Into the Fire
