An avid tennis player, one of the things that attracted him to Crafton Hills College was tennis instructor, Ralph Rabago. "He is one of the highest credentialed tennis instructors I know," said Darin. Between playing tennis and basketball in high school, Darin ended up with an injured shoulder that required surgery. He couldn't play for almost three years but is back on the courts whenever possible now.

STEM + WATER= FUN

Middle school students were on campus at the Aquatics Center for the week of July 22-25 for the First Annual Inland Empire Underwater Robotics Camp. The camp was a partnership between the Banning Science & Technology Center, the UCR MESA Center, and the San Bernardino Community College District.

The class learned to make an underwater robot and had a competition with their finished products. They learned sol-

dering, PVC pipe cutting, water dynamics, navigating in three dimensions, and how to keep a scientific/engineering notebook.







What is (LCS)2?

With funding from a grant from Google, Crafton Hills College has developed a new project, Learning Computer Science through the Lens of Culture and Society (LCS)2. The project, led by Margaret Yau, is designed to increase the participation of Hispanic/Latino(a) high school students in computer science and encourage them to explore higher education and careers in computer science.

The first project is a free two-day workshop for high school STEM teachers, which was held on campus on July 31 and August 1. The workshop explained the computer science major in higher education and its career possibilities and demonstrated technological tools that the teachers could use to teach computer science principles. Each teacher who completed the workshop received a \$400 stipend.



THE LEFT LANE IS THE FAST LANE @ CHC

Last fall, Crafton Hills College launched the Left Lane Project (LLP) to reduce the average time of AA/AS completion to four years from the current average of 5.3 years. Components of the LLP include Summer Bridge Program, learning communities, supplemental instruction, counseling and tutoring services, and services provided through SOA3R (Senior Orientation, Application, Assessment, Advising and Registration).

LLP started with 276 students, 258 earned a grade on record (GOR) in Fall 2012 and 87% of those students completed Spring 2013 classes. Lovely Jaasiel Romulo, a 2012 Redlands High School graduate, was one of those students. "It's an excellent program," she said. Romulo participated in the Summer Bridge Program last year. "Bridge filled in the gap between high school and college," she said. "They showed us what college would be like. You learned what professors expect—like bring a pen and paper to class."


Romulo's goal is to transfer to UCR and major in sociology. When she started college she wished she had a mentor to help her learn the ropes because she's the oldest child in her family, and now she's become a mentor herself by helping facilitate a basic skills-level math class. She originally thought she would volunteer to tutor in the Tutoring Center, but it was suggested she help in a class instead because she could bring the unique experience of teacher and student to the classroom.



"I was required to complete an Education Plan before I started at CHC. It really helps to keep me on track. And the priority registration makes a huge difference," she said. LLP students receive Priority B registration which helps them get the classes they need. Romulo has a full load of transfer-level classes scheduled for this fall. She also helps prove the theory that students who complete their transfer-level math and English early are more successful in completing their AA/AS degree.


As the charts below indicate, the Left Lane Project students are succeeding at a higher rate than the resident population.

Percent of Students Successfully Completing English and Math Courses



Left Lane students were substantially and statistically significantly more likely to successfully complete English (82% to 69%) and math (64% to 51%) courses than students in the comparison group.

Retention from Fall to Spring in English and Math



Left Lane students who earned a GOR in English and math in Fall 2012 were substantially and statistically significantly more likely to enroll in an English course (65% to 46%) and math course (56% to 43%) in Spring 2013 than the comparison group.
