#### **Graduation!**

The 2013 Crafton Hills College (CHC) Commencement will be held in the Campus Quad on Thursday, May 23, beginning at 6 p.m. The event should complete by 7:30 p.m. This community celebration is open to the public and parking is free on campus that evening. Approximately 550 students will be eligible to walk in Commencement this year, having earned over 700 degrees and certificates in the fall 2012 and spring 2013 semesters. Speakers for the Commencement and the names of the graduates will be announced in the next weeks.

Festivities begin with a Graduation Breakfast in the cafeteria served by faculty, staff and administrators on Thursday morning, immediately following the graduation rehearsal which begins at 8:30 a.m.

Commencement is the culmination of a busy month of events that includes the EOPS Graduation and Scholars Ceremony (May 10), the Scholars Convocation (May 16), the Transfer Recognition Celebration (May 17), and the EMT Graduation (May 22), all of which follow the Fire Academy Graduation that was held on April 18 and the Student Recognition Dinner held on May 3.

# 30th Reunion of Fire Academy Graduates

Crafton Hills College takes pride in providing quality training and educational programs that enhance our community. For 30 years, the Crafton Hills College Fire Academy has prepared our local firefighters to extinguish fires, provide emergency medical care to the sick and injured, respond to traffic collisions, perform technical rescue, and so much more.

On April 12, over 60 alumni, faculty, staff, administrators, retirees, cadets, and friends gathered to celebrate 30 years of excellence in training for the Crafton Hills College Fire Academy. The Alumni Association is working to establish relationships between alumni and Crafton which will strengthen the college and increase opportunities for students. All alumni, the cadets from the 78 graduating classes, were invited to return to Crafton for this fundraising luncheon which raised over \$625 to help provide necessary equipment for our Academy through donations and sponsorships.

Highlights included a speaker, Leonard Temby who chronicled the history of the Academy and his father, the late Ed Temby's role in establishing the program at Crafton Hills College. A certificate of recognition was presented on behalf of the California State Senate by Art Welch, representative from the office of Senator Bill Emerson (23rd District).

Some of the many benefits of the initiatives include decreased environmental impact, lower energy and water costs, and reduced waste costs. Solar power is being harnessed through the 7 acre solar farm and the thermal panels which provide a portion of heating for the pool.

The installation over the past two years of energy systems for lighting and HVAC help manage utility usage and costs. Irrigation and storm control systems are in place to reduce water usage and flooding.

A newly expanded recycling program and our green waste program will both enhance our efforts to reduce land fill waste. All of these programs exemplify our commitment to sustaining our environment and reducing our costs.

## Transfer Center Numbers Impressive

The Transfer Center opened in the Spring 2012, funded in large part by the Hispanic Serving Institution Title V grant. The Center has been a whirlwind of activity and is showing successful results. In large part, Center Coordinator Mariana Moreno attributes those results to the faculty involvement of the Transfer Advocates program.

The Transfer Center encourages students to consider transferring on to a four year college or university through university visits and transfer fairs, workshops, classroom presentations, transfer agreements that guarantee acceptance for our students if all conditions are met, the available computer lab and other resources on universities and this year's new event, the Transfer Recognition Celebration, scheduled for May 17.

The Transfer Advocate Program (TA) presents a rare opportunity for faculty to encourage, support and mentor students who are considering transferring. The CHC Transfer Advocates are 15 instructional faculty, including representatives of all three academic divisions who participate in two trainings per semester and staff the mobile transfer center. The TAs are the liaisons through which their discipline or department disseminates transfer-related information to interested students. The program began in Fall 2011, and over its existence has reported almost 4000 student contacts. Individual TAs have demonstrated a variety of methods of assisting students.

Transfer Fairs this year experienced a 39% increase in student contacts over the prior year. The number of individual applicants to CSU San Bernardino increased 42% from Fall 2011 to Fall 2012, and the corollary number of CHC students applying to the University of California system increased 45% over the same time period. As they say, 'the proof is in the pudding' – and the numbers all support the exceptional dedication of the TAs in supporting student transfer activities, and to the other undertakings provided by Transfer and Honor Center staff.
