As you know, we completed the accreditation site visit at the beginning of the month and have been putting action plans in place to address the College's findings. We will submit an update to the Commission by the end of December and I plan to attend the Commission meeting in early January to present the information.

The HACU Conference was definitely worthwhile, especially for the students. One of my favorite sessions was about a mentoring program for young men of color that has seen great success. We will be looking at how we can replicate the best practices from this session and a number of others.

We hosted a group of construction engineering and management students from USC for the second time on October 11 and they continue to find it beneficial. The real world examples of LEED projects and the impact of construction on a campus help bring to life the principles they are learning in their class.

Our projects on workforce development continue to make progress. We are near completion on our proposal for the pilot baccalaureate degree and will submit this for your review and approval in December. The workforce development proposal for Region 9 is also near completion and we look forward to presenting it to State Vice Chancellor Van Ton-Quinlivan. The project with LLU for the Gateway College is moving forward with their groundbreaking taking place on December 12. We developed and presented to the committee some possible educational pathways for consideration between SBCUSD, SBCCD, and LLU.

It has definitely been a busy month!

The Elect Her workshop is designed to address the need to increase the number of women running for office and to diminish the longstanding gender gap in political leadership. The students will have the opportunity to connect with and become inspired by women who have political aspirations and accomplishments, to learn about pathways to elected office, and to learn how to build coalitions and leverage organizational support for their campaigns. In addition, one student from each of the sponsoring colleges will receive a National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) scholarship, which includes travel and registration for the national conference in Washington, D.C. in May 2015.
