Local Kids Benefit from CHC Volunteers

A group of students and faculty from the Division of Arts and Sciences participated in back to school events at two low-income manufactured home communities in Yucaipa. The communities, Grandview East Estates and Rancho del Sol, are managed by Millenium Housing.

Rosie Friedland, the Regional Director of SPARC, Services and Programs Assisting Residence in Our Communities, coordinated the events. SPARC provides programming for Millenium Housing communities throughout the state of California. The two communities in Yucaipa are Millenium's only communities in the Inland Empire.

A total of 100 school age children from both communities attended one of the two events. All the children attending the event received free school sup-

plies, including a backpack, looseleaf paper, calculators, pens, colored pencils and crayons. Crafton Hills College donated folders and pencils for each of the children.

In addition to receiving school supplies, the children participated in activities led by CHC students and faculty. Students in Julie McKee's SOC 100, Introductory Sociology course helped students paint "roadrunner" houses while team members from the STEM Pathways grant provided science demonstrations and taught the kids how to make their own "slime."
