Supporters gathered under a tent set up in the College's quad on April 6 to raise funds for the CHC Foundation, a nonprofit dedicated to bettering the lives of Roadrunners.

The annual event and Foundation's largest fundraiser brought in thousands through student sponsorships and silent and live auctions. Items included behind-the-plate seating at an Angels baseball game and a seven-night stay at any Wyndham Timeshare Resort.

Since its founding, the CHC Foundation has helped students reach their dreams of higher education. The Foundation does this by raising funds year-round to support student scholarships, financial hardship grants and educational programs.

Students Dakota Erwin, a member of the current graduating class, and Anthony Estrada, a recent Crafton grad, explained to the Night Out audience how without the nonprofit's support, they might not have achieved their educational goals.

"When I came to Crafton three years ago, I came here for one class and stayed here for the rest. I love this campus so much," Erwin said. "The Crafton Foundation gave

me my first scholarship last year and I was so honored."

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"I didn't think I could come back to college and work full-time until I realized I'm never going to make enough money to go back to school so I might as well do both," she continued. "I worked full-time. I came back for that one class and the opportunities that Crafton gave me made me realize I could do both."

"Dakota hit the nail on the head," Estrada added minutes later. "Truly, thank you. I'm not sure a lot of you understand when I say, 'Thank you,' how much it means to me because I'm not one of those guys that usually asks for help. But when I reached out to [Paramedic Director] Amanda [Ward] and the Foundation, they helped me with open arms and continue to help me to this day."

Guests also enjoyed comments from Crafton leaders and a brief musical performance from Foundation President Dr. Phong Nguyen.

This year's Outstanding Alumnus honor went to Dr. Stephanie Houston, a rockstar in the world of education who currently chairs the San Bernardino Community College District Board and serves as assistant superintendent of innovation and engagement for the San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools.

Application Fees Waived for Transfer Students

The Crafton Hills College Foundation provides student fee waivers to cover the application fees for Roadrunners transferring to four-year schools, providing financial relief for low-income students and enabling them to apply to more universities.

Applicants with a 2.5 GPA or higher and attendance at an application workshop can apply for fee waivers through the CHC Transfer Center. The Foundation has supported over 250 students since 2015 and aims to extend educational opportunities to all CHC students through scholarships, grants, and other funding

sources.

The fee to apply to one UC or CSU campus is \$70. Through this program at Crafton, students are able to receive reimbursement of application fees for applications at two institutions.


