The luncheon was titled, "Honoring the Brave, the Proud, and the Strong." The CHC First Fire Academy members graduated November 1, 1982.

Dispersed throughout the room were proud members of the First Fire Academy, whose uniforms displayed various insignias representing fire departments from throughout the region. Their ranks reflected their long careers in fire service.

Also among those in the audi-

ence as guests and sitting with the honorees were cadets from the most recent CHC 67th Fire Academy.

CHC Fire Academy Chief Dan Sullivan, CHC President Gloria Macias Harrison, and San Bernardino Community College District Board Trustee James Ramos presented each of the First Academy graduates with certificates recognizing their contributions to the communities in the region.

Additionally, the Office of California State Senator Bob Dutton presented current CHC Fire Academy Chief Dan Sullivan with a proclamation recognizing the CHC First Fire Academy for their accomplishments.

The proclamation noted that the training and education the First Fire Academy received "saved lives and contributed to the betterment of our communities in many areas."

It also praised the CHC First Fire Academy for setting the high standards for each successive Fire Academy.

"The importance of firefighters as first responders is paramount to the public's safety. We take great pride in recognizing the Crafton Hills College First Fire Academy for their contributions to the success

of the local communities and the state of California. They truly represent the brave, the proud, and the strong."

Special guest speaker was the First Fire Academy President Dennis Marsh, who is now a retired Laguna Beach fire chief.

During his presentation, Marsh recognized his fellow alumni and the bond that exists even after 25 years.

He recalled the rigorous training they received in preparation for their careers in fire service.

Marsh acknowledged the young cadets in the current academy and noted that the hard work, dedication, and brotherhood in fire service has never changed.

He closed by calling out the standard Academy cadence used by all CHC cadets when they marched, ran, and were put through drills. Both the First Academy honorees and the current cadets stood up and called out the cadence in unison.

Since 1982, approximately 2,000 cadets have graduated from the Academy and 500 students have received A.S. degrees.

CHC serves as a regional training center for firefighters in San Bernardino and Riverside.

Steinberg Architects Feature Renderings at Chamber Mixer

On November 1, Steinberg Architects, the architectural firm selected to oversee the master plan design work of Crafton Hills College (CHC) through 2025, provided a master plan presentation during a Chamber of Commerce mixer at the CHC Cafeteria.

Local chambers of commerce invited included Yucaipa, Redlands, Highland, Mentone, Banning, Beaumont, Calimesa, and Colton.

Groundbreaking for the first new building, the Learning Resource Center (LRC)/Library, is scheduled for 2008. The LRC would include the library, tutoring center and computer labs.

The master plan proposes the idea of "clustering" the different academic programs in their own respective areas. An example of "clustering" would be to have the emergency services programs in one area of the campus, all science programs in another area, all

humanities in another area, and so forth. "Clustering" was the original intent of CHC architect Stewart Williams when he designed the campus in the 60s.

Included in the 2012 layout is a General Education Building and a Learning Resource Center located on the peninsula between the Finkelstein Performing Arts Center and the Student Services B Building. Also included are a parking structure and a natatorium (pool area).

The plan calls for approximately 75 percent of the cost for the LRC and General Education Building to be funded from State bond money, and approximately 25 percent from Measure P, a bond issue approved in a local election in 2001.

Steinberg Architects are interested in reinforcing the beautiful park-like setting, including setting up outdoor tables that take advantage of the views; creating outdoor spaces to accommodate a diver-

sity of academic, social, and community uses; increasing the number and diversity of trees; adding special features such as water and art; and diversifying the plants.

In October 2004, the San Bernardino Community College District Board of Trustees approved the selection of Steinberg Architects for architectural services and master planning and design work at CHC. Steinberg Architects, a Los Angeles firm, has extensive experience working on master planning and design for community colleges throughout California.

In preparing the plan, Steinberg Architects interviewed faculty, staff, students, and the public regarding ideas and needs for the college's future.

Based on the ongoing growth in the surrounding communities, Steinberg Architects projected a potential student enrollment of 7,150 students in 2012, 9,300 students in 2018, and 11,400 students in 2025.
