# Research Briefs from the Office of Research & Planning Possible Student Demand for a CHC ESL Program

**Purpose:** The third planned action in the 2009 – 2010 BSI Action Plan seeks to conduct research into the viability of an English as a Second Language (ESL) Program at Crafton Hills College (CHC). Accordingly, this brief examines the possible student demand for ESL courses at CHC.

### Summary of Findings:

- The CCSSE indicates that approximately 624 (12%) students each term are interested in taking an ESL course
- 12 out of 9,517 (0.1%) students who earned a GOR in 2008-2009 at Crafton also enrolled in an ESL course at SBVC
- Census Data from the 2006 2008 American Communities Survey indicates that approximately 131,000 people over the age of 18 in Crafton's primary service area speak a language other than English
- According to the 2009 Growth API School Report there are approximately 1,400 high school students in six CHC feeder high schools each year who are English Language Learners
- 16% of people who take the CHC Accuplacer Assessment were taught in a language other than English at some point in their life
- 5% of people who take the CHC Accuplacer Assessment primarily speak a language other than English
- 4% of people who take the CHC Accuplacer Assessment prefer to speak a language other than English to their family and friends.

*Methodology*: In order to identify the possible student demand for ESL courses at CHC five data sources were used. First, results from the CHC Spring 2009 Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE) were examined to indentify the number of students who expressed interest in enrolling in ESL courses at CHC. Second, Datatel was used to identify the number of 2008 – 2009 students who earned a grade on record (GOR; A, B, C, D, F, I, NP, P, or W) at CHC and who had also earned a GOR at San Bernardino Valley College (SBVC) in an ESL course. Third, Census data for residents who primarily speak a language other than English at home for CHC's primary and secondary service areas were calculated. Fourth, the proportion of English Language Learners (ELLs) from six CHC feeder high schools was identified from the 2009 Growth API (Academic Performance Index) School Report. Fifth, three questions on the Accuplacer Assessment Test ask people who took the assessment about their preference for speaking English. Responses on the English speaking questions are provided for people who took the assessment test from June 1<sup>st</sup>, 2009 to May 31<sup>st</sup>, 2010.

*Definitions*: CHC's **primary service area (PSA)** includes all of the cities where 100 or more Fall 2009 CHC students who earned a GOR reside. The students in these nine cities accounted for 85% of all the CHC students who earned a GOR in Fall 2009: Beaumont, Calimesa, Colton, Highland, Loma Linda, Mentone, Redlands, San Bernardino, and Yucaipa. The **secondary service area (SSA)** includes all of the cities where 40 or more CHC students who earned a GOR live. These cities include Banning, Cherry Valley, Crestline, Fontana, Moreno Valley, Rancho Cucamonga, Rialto, Riverside, and Running Springs. The students in the eighteen PSA and SSA cities account for 93% of all the CHC students who earned a GOR in Fall 2009.

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*Findings*: The CCSSE was administered in Spring 2009 to a random sample of 41 weekly census sections at CHC with 10 or more students enrolled at Census. Accordingly, the results are most likely representative of CHC students who take a weekly census course (i.e. a course that spans the entire length of the semester). In Spring 2009, weekly census sections consisted of 69% of the sections offered at CHC and 82% (n = 5,379) of the students who were enrolled at census were enrolled in a weekly census section. Approximately, 1,115 students in the 41 sections had an opportunity to complete the survey, of those 701 (63%) responded to the survey. One of the questions on the CCSSE asked students the following question: Have you done, are you doing, or do you plan to take an English as a Second Language (ESL) course while attending this college? The results indicated that 11.6% of Spring 2009 CHC students plan or have taken an ESL course while attending CHC. These results suggest that approximately 624 (11.6% \* 5,379 students = 624) CHC students are interested in ESL courses each primary term.

Next, information from Datatel was used to identify the number of students who earned a GOR in 2008 – 2009 and who had also enrolled in at least one SBVC ESL course from Summer 2009 to Spring 2009. The results indicated that 12 out of 9,517 (0.1%) students who earned a GOR in the 2008 – 2009 academic year also enrolled in an ESL course at SBVC. Four of these students lived in Redlands, three in San Bernardino, two in Highland, and one student lived in Beaumont, one in Colton, and one in Fontana.

Tables 1 and 2 use Census data to illustrate the number and percent of the population for the CHC primary service areas. The results indicated that approximately 131,000 people 18 years old or older speak a language other than English (see Table 2).

Table 3 illustrates the number and percent of English Language Learners (ELL) in six of the CHC feeder high schools. The results indicated that there are approximately 1,400 high school students each year who are ELL.

Tables 4 – 6 provide information from people who completed the Accuplacer Assessment Test from June 1<sup>st</sup>, 2009 to May 31<sup>st</sup>, 2010. Table 4 indicates that approximately 16% of the students at Crafton were taught in a language other than English at some time in their life. Sixteen percent of 6,485—the number of students who earned a grade on record in Fall 2009—is approximately 1,038; suggesting that there are approximately 1,000 students who might be interested in or need to take ESL courses. In addition, 5% of the people who took the assessment test do not primarily speak English (see Table 5), and 4% prefer to speak a language other than English with their friends and family (see Table 6).
