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Student Conduct Problems

- Academic Dishonesty
- Disruption
- Dangerous/Unlawful Behaviors

Academic Dishonesty includes Plagiarism:

- Copying and pasting text from websites without citation
- Copying and pasting text from printed sources without citation
- Using another student's work and claiming it as your own

Academic Dishonesty Includes Cheating:

- Copying from another student's test or assignment
- Allowing others to copy from you
- Stealing, buying, or obtaining all or part of a test before it is administered
- Selling or giving away all or part of a test before it is administered
- Having someone attend a course in your place
- Failing to follow test-taking procedures

Academic Dishonesty Includes Fabrication:

- Signing a roll sheet for another student
- Giving false information to college personnel
- Answering verbal or written questions in an untrue manner
- Inventing data or sources of information for papers or other assignments

Preventing Academic Dishonesty

- Address your behavioral and academic standards in your syllabus
- Remind students that they are on the honor system when they take your exams.
- Repeat your expectations throughout the semester
- Share your expectations regarding the use of old tests for study purposes
- Refrain from recycling exams

Handling Academic Dishonesty

- The faculty member has several options:
- No action
- Verbal reprimand
- Require that work is repeated
- □ Grade of F for that assignment
- Reduction in course grade as a result of above
- Referral to Office of VPSS for further administrative action

Disruptive Students Interfere with the Learning Environment:

- Hostile, belligerent, verbally aggressive, argumentative, willfully disobedient, defiant, or profane
- May behave in a bizarre or inappropriate fashion
- May be unreasonably demanding
- Usually focus attention on themselves

With Disruptive Students:

- Stay Calm
- Direct them to stop the behavior immediately
- If the behavior continues, direct them to leave
- Tell them why
- Send them to Rebeccah
- Contact College Police if necessary
- Complete an Incident Report Form within 24 hours

Dangerous/Unlawful Students:

- May disrupt the environment, may not
- May engage in:
 - Physical violence
 - Possession of a weapon
 - Expression of thoughts of suicide
 - Destruction of college property
 - Exhibitionistic behavior

With the Dangerous/Unlawful Student

- Contact College Police or send a student or colleague to do so
- If suicidal, listen to the student, then immediately contact college police
- Document the incident by completing an Incident Report Form. Route to Police and to the VPSS.

Document the Incident!

Incident Report should

- Focus on the behavior
- Include who, what, where, when
- Include the names and contact information of witnesses
- Send the report to the VPSS

Teaching Academic Honesty :

- Catch problems early
- Address these before they escalate
- Dialog with the student
- Make the syllabus match your expectations
- Assign a failing grade for that assignment
- Refer to VPSS if there is a pattern of academic dishonesty

Addressing Disruptive Behavior :

- Catch problems early
- Address these before they escalate
- Once a student disrupts the service or learning environment, act immediately
- Contact College Police when you feel in over your head
- Document, document, document

Handling the Dangerous/Unlawful Student:

- Contact College Police or send a student or colleague to do so
- If suicidal, listen to the student, then immediately contact college police
- Document the incident by completing an Incident Report Form. Route to Police and VPSS.
