New Respiratory Care Program Lauds First Graduates

In August 2008, the Respiratory Care Program at Crafton Hills College converted from a one plus one program format to an advanced level only Respiratory Care Program.

In a ceremony held on December 19th, the first graduating class for this new program (and the 31st Respiratory Care graduating class) was held at CHC. All students have earned the title of Registry Eligible Respiratory Therapist. Once they pass all three of their board exams they will achieve the title Registered Respiratory Therapist.



The December 19th event celebrated 46 students graduating from the Respiratory Care Program at Crafton Hills College.

Under the guidance of Program Director Ken Bryson, 46 students met the requirements for graduation with special recognition being given to Perry Pollick (Academic Award) and Rachel Howell (Clinical Award).

The EMT-Basic program determines which students can handle the unique patient care and can handle the pressure and the responsibility that goes along with being an emergency medical technician.

Paramedic Class #72 Graduation Ceremony Recognizes 26 Students

Twenty-six students received Emergency Medical Technician-Paramedic Certificates at the Crafton Hills College (CHC) Paramedic Class #72 graduation ceremony on December 9, 2009.

The graduates were required to complete a comprehensive 1,200-hour course teaching emergency medical care, including learning skills to handle trauma situations, cardiac problems, respiratory problems, delivering babies, emergency care for children and clinical and field externships.
