CHI Becomes Partner in UCLA TAP

Crafton Hills College was notified that our Honors Institute was accepted into UCLA's Transfer Alliance Program. The Transfer Alliance Program (TAP) gives students the opportunity to enhance their ability to transfer to UCLA at the junior level from a California community college. Students are certified after completing the honors program at their community college and given priority consideration for admission to UCLA College of Letters and Science. Crafton's Honors Coordinator, Jennifer Floerke, worked diligently on the application and her efforts



paid off. In reviewing the application, UCLA staff noted a number of strengths in our program including:

- A dedicated physical space in close proximity to the Coordinator's office
- Strong student support services
- Good collaboration with college programs that target first-generation and historically underrepresented students

Crafton students will benefit from the agreement through cooperation with UCLA in easing the transfer process. Students will also have the opportunity to attend on-campus events at UCLA.

Native American Days to be held Nov. 8-9

The annual California's First Cultures: A Celebration at Crafton Hills/Waa't will be held Thursday, Nov. 8 and Friday, Nov. 9. Each day's activities begin at 9 a.m.. The event is held in recognition of National Native American Heritage Month, proclaimed annually by President Obama, and observance of the Native American Heritage Day on September 22. The CHC celebration brings together Redlands and Yucaipa elementary school children and Native American instructors from the San Manuel Education Department to teach the children the Indian culture of Southern California. Student take part in hands-on lessons covering aspects of Native American culture including basketry, pottery, music and lessons in the Serrano Indian language and the history of the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians.





Great California Shake Out

The fire alarms went off at exactly 10:18 on Thursday October 18, as Crafton Hills College participated in The Great Shake Out. The drill helped the college to be prepared to survive and recover quickly from a large-scale earthquake. Students, faculty and staff responded to the alarms by leaving the classrooms and meeting at evacuation sites around the campus.


After the drill, a debriefing to evaluate what went well and what needed improvement took place with faculty, staff, Chief Dan Sullivan, Captain Paye, and San Bernardino Community College District Police Officer Jose Plasencia. Mike Strong, Vice President Of Administrative Services, accepted suggestions and complaints about the drill.

Captain Paye explained to the campus leaders, "You need to be the voice of reason to your group." He reminded them that there are capable adults at CHC, and that Cal Fire would need to check the elementary schools and other areas in the city in the case of an actual emergency. He recommended that Crafton Hills College "prepare yourselves to be alone for a little while." After Hurricane Katrina, the guidelines have changed from being prepared to being self-sustaining, now for up to seven days. Captain Paye said that the EMS Department at Crafton Hills College would be a good resource, and that the water from the pool could be boiled to drink.

Students on campus took the Great Shake Out in stride, as Sam Worrall said, "It was just like a fire drill."
