## Commencement 2013!



The 2013 CHC Commencement was held in the Campus Quad on May 23. More than 600 students were eligible to participate this year, having earned approximately 700 degrees and certificates in the fall 2012 and spring 2013 semesters.

Dr. Cheryl Marshall, President of Crafton Hills College, welcomed the guests and the dignitaries were introduced by Chancellor Bruce Baron. The very traditional ceremony honored the successful graduates with individual introductions as they crossed the stage. A number of them were awarded the new Associate in Arts for Transfer degree, which facilitates transfer to the CSU system.



Denise Allen Hoyt, Academic Senate President, provided the graduates with "A Thought for the Future", and the Salute to the Flag was done by Kyle Hundley, graduating sophomore and CHC Student Senate President and Student Trustee. The National Anthem was performed by a chorus of CHC music students, lead by Professor Mark McConnell.

The Student Commencement Speaker was Rayna Zaragoza, who served as this year's outgoing president of Alpha Gamma Sigma Honor Society, an organization dedicated to scholarship and community service. Additionally, she has worked as a tutor in our Tutoring Center. With her ultimate goal of being a neonatal intensive care nurse as her guide, she plans on attending Loma Linda University in the Fall.



Nathan Westwick, founder of Wild Goose Coffee Company addressed the graduates. A 1992 graduate of Yucaipa High School, he earned his degree in mathematics at UCSD, and then returned home to teach at his Alma Mater. He has taught nearly all levels of mathematics at YHS, and has written a Business and Personal Finance curriculum that he has taught for the past decade. Pursuing his passion for coffee and philanthropy, he started Wild Goose Coffee Company in 2008. Beginning with a small booth at Redlands Market Night, Wild Goose now roasts high-end coffees, operating a full-scale wholesale operation next door to the Hangar 24 Brewery in Redlands. Wild Goose Coffee can be found as nearby as Yucaipa and as far away as Washington. Nathan founded the business based on a model of giving back—for every pound of coffee they sell, whether retail or wholesale, Wild Goose Coffee buys 10 pounds of food for local food banks—to date, over a quarter of a million pounds of food have been donated to families in need through this business-model, and this number is rapidly growing.

## EOPS Celebration

On May 10, 2013, the EOPS/CARE/CalWORKs Program celebrated the academic accomplishments of their students. Lance Andrews, CHC '06, spoke, urging the attendees to be proud of their accomplishments. The students who will be graduating in Spring and Summer 2013 received a medal and an EOPS graduate sash signifying their completion of their academic goal and success. Students who completed 24 units or more with a 3.0 GPA or higher received a Certificate of Achievement in recognition of their academic accomplishments. Almost 100 students were acknowledged by the EOPS and College administrators.
