Mentone Elementary and Inland Leaders Charter School were two of the area elementary schools who brought their fourth graders to take part in hands-on lessons covering aspects of Native American culture including basketry, pottery, music, language and history.

Elders like Ernest Siva and Robert Levi of the Serrano and Cahuilla people used traditional songs to bring new generations together. November is Native American Heritage month.



Sarmiento Reaches Out Through Student Senate Role

Sarmiento said."I want to be able to share information between the students and faculty regarding academics."

Sarmiento hopes that in her new role she will be able to spend the next year serving as "a voice for the student body and to let them know that their ideas matter on campus." She is studying political science and history, and plans to transfer to a four-year university and continue on to law school.

"I hope to be able to encourage students along my educational journey to be more involved and get familiar with their campus by getting out of their comfort zone," Sarmiento said. "Being involved in the Student Senate has allowed me to meet people I never would have met on campus, students and faculty alike. It has really opened my eyes to all the awesome things Crafton is involved in and all the ways we as students can make a difference."

PUENTE Project Being Explored

Kathy Martinez from the PUENTE Project came to Crafton on Tuesday, November 22 to explain the national award-winning program to interested faculty, staff and students as part of Crafton's professional development program. PUENTE's mission is to increase the number of educationally disadvantaged students who enroll in four-year colleges and universities, earn college degrees and return to the community as mentors and leaders to future generations. The program is interdisciplinary in approach, with writing, counseling and mentoring components.

"Persistence is higher for PUENTE students than traditional community college students," said Martinez.

Susana de la Pena, English instructor, is championing the program at Crafton and working on the program viability report. PUENTE requires a dedicated English faculty member and Counselor. PUENTE staff train the instructors and counselors to implement a program of rigorous instruction, focused academic counseling, and mentoring by members of the community.

If Crafton moves forward they could potentially receive \$5,000 in start-up funding from PUENTE.
