Please indulge me as I share some thoughts - this is an important part of my transition to the next step in my journey.

As you can imagine, the past year has involved a lot of soul searching and reflection. The decision to leave Crafton has not been an easy one – but as my insightful son said to me: Sometimes you have to build the track and then let someone else drive the train. The past 9 years have been formative, pivotal and momentous in shaping who I am as an educational leader and Crafton will forever be a part of my heart and soul.
