Congratulations Class of 2018!

It was a perfect evening for graduation on Friday, May 25. Crafton's newest class is composed of 700 graduates who earned 574 associates degrees and 342 certificates. Of those degrees, close to 180 – or 31 percent – are associate in arts or science degrees which guarantees admission and junior status into the California State University system.

Of the 700, close to 170 graduated with honors, with 25 graduates leaving Crafton with a 4.0 GPA.

This year's class is also quite diverse with 28 percent of students becoming the first in their families to graduate from college or earn a post-secondary certificate. Sixty percent of the class of 2018 are female, while 42 percent are Hispanic, 43 percent are Caucasian, five percent are white, nine percent are Asian, and 1 percent are Pacific Islander or Native Hawaiian. Twenty-four graduates are military veterans.

Three Faculty Selected for Inspiring Students

Three professors specializing in different fields were named Professors of the Year for the 2017-18 school year.

Margaret Yau, a professor of computer science and computer information systems, Scott Simonson, an adjunct professor of music, and Snezana Petrovic, chair of the fine arts department at Crafton, were selected from a pool of nominees for the designation.

Every year, CHC faculty and staff nominate their peers for the title. Those selected this year join a growing list of faculty members who go above and beyond their commitment of inspiring students to continue their desired path of success.

Yau enjoys teaching on a community college level because she can reach a diverse student population.

"It's a great setting to help bridge the gap for students who just came out of high school, or students who haven't gone to school for a couple of years, or just a student who wants to learn," she explained.

Originally from Hong Kong, Yau had other plans for herself outside of a classroom setting. But it was while attending University of California, Berkeley that she found her "calling" and hasn't looked back since starting at Crafton in 2011.

Like Yau, Petrovic, too, enjoys the wide demographic of students she can reach at Crafton.

She also knows what it is like to adapt to a completely new setting having hailed originally from Yugoslavia. And when coming to America, Petrovic said she had a lot to prove, starting with showing her folks back home that she could live off her art.

It was while attending grad school at University of California, Irvine that Petrovic's mentors encouraged her to head inside the classroom. And after years of creating, she found the means to do just that. "Pretty much after a decade or so you get to the place where you can teach others and share that knowledge and experience," she said.

Music has been a part of Scott Simonson's upbringing since the age of 8. Today, he helps students unlock their talent by unlocking "two sides" of the picture: the serious side and the fun side.

"And if one is not fun, then why are you doing it," he said.

Simonson got into teaching mostly because he likes helping others, he explained. He came onboard Crafton five years ago and calls himself the "captain of the ship" by helping students discover a bigger picture of music.

"You can't focus on the day-to-day too much," he said.
