# **Eyes of Freedom Leaves Lasting Impression**



The *Eyes of Freedom* traveling memorial was on display in the Crafton Center from April 10-12 and left a lasting impression. Carla Thornton, veterans coordinator and counselor, also arranged a Veterans Resource Fair for April 12. She shared the following from these events:

1. During the Veterans Resource Fair an Army service member on terminal leave (last 30 days of military service) was able to connect with Department of Veterans Affairs, the SB County Veterans Office and the Employment Development office. He approached me at the fair and said that even though he went through a transition program at his last post, this fair provided him with the information he needed to live here in SB County.

2. Teachers from Art and Sociology took their entire class to view the Eyes of Freedom and used the memorial to discuss topics such as society, war, social problems and the art techniques of the paintings.

3. My favorite stories included the NUMEROUS people who revealed to Mike and Sean (from *Eyes of Freedom*) of their personal experiences with suicide. Even I was impacted

by the bronze sculpture, "Silent Battle," that reminded me of two service members that I know who committed suicide.

#### Stats from the event:

1. Over a 1000 students, staff, faculty and community members saw the *Eyes of Freedom*.

2. We had 21 veteran serving- organizations at the Veterans Resource Fair.

The **Veterans Center** has been designated a Millitary Friendly School for 2018-19.

Now in its 17th year, the Military Friendly® Schools list has come to set the standard for higher education institutions to provide the best opportunities for veterans and their spouses. This prestigious list provides a comprehensive guide for veterans and their families using data sources from federal agencies, veteran students and proprietary survey information from participating organizations.

The **Respiratory Care** program has been recognized by the Commission on Accreditation for Respiratory Care (CoARC) with a *Distinguished RRT Credentialing Success* Award.

CoARC used objective criteria based on key accreditation metrics. The program had to have three+ years of outcome data, hold accreditation without a progress report, document RRT credentialing success of 90% or above, and meet or exceed established CoARC thresholds for CRT credentialing success, retention, on-time graduation rate, and overall employer and graduate satisfaction.

# **Honors Students Hone Presentation Skills**

Thirteen Honors students got to see first-hand what it is like to present their own research at an academic conference when they traveled to the Honors Transfer Council of California (HTCC) Student Research Conference held at UC Irvine on April 7.

Nine of those students presented projects they have been working on for several months. The topics ranged from the role of dopamine in schizophrenia, to reality TV star Jinger Duggar's progression through Erikson's stages of development, to socioeconomic status and the use of vending machines.

Oral presenter Victoria Karalun said, "I loved being part of a team of enthusiastic students,

all committed to working hard and doing our best. I loved that we traveled there as a team and mostly spent the day together, working hard to represent our college the best we could. Being part of such a large crowd of people all committed to research and excellence was exciting and empowering and made me want to push harder to improve my own research. Being encouraged to speak in front of a crowd of strangers gave me insight into strengths I didn't know I had and would like to explore further."

The research presentations were in one of two formats: oral



presentations (with slides) and posters. Karalun was joined by five other oral presenters: Kristy Beck, Ramina Gharibgard, Andrea Gomez, Daniel McCluskey, and Reem Sarsour. Three students presented their research in poster format: Pargoal Arab, Maranda Jiles, and Jason Mathew.

Four Crafton Honors students attended the conference as moderators and were assigned to introduce and time speakers and facilitate questions after each presentation. Jazmin Alfara, Leen Alkaddumi, Emily Hinckley, and Sarah Hoang were each inspired by seeing the quality of the presentations. Leen noted, "Being a moderator definitely motivated me to finish my research and present it next year." Emily added, "I enjoy being a moderator because it's a great way to get involved in research environments. It can seem very intimidating to participate in a conference at first, but when I attended as a moderator, I saw that it's not that stressful, and it made me want to participate as a researcher next time."

Faculty mentors and supporters also attended to cheer our students on. Dr. T.L. Brink, the faculty mentor for many of the projects, was there, along with anthropology professor Cheryl DiBartolo, history professor Lindsay Weiler, and Honors Coordinator Judy Cannon.
