He shared with the audience and graduates lessons learned throughout his career.


passion for sharing Italy with the students through reading and writing. The texts I will choose will be related to the areas we visit and stay." Crafton Hills College

Another speaker presented a historical perspective about civil rights in the 1960s and how Beatles' songs helped people find hope and courage in a time of inequality. A pan-

Sabrina Bruni

When Crafton Hills College student Sabrina Bruni was two-years-old, the house next door caught on fire. The neighbors watched the firefighters work on the scene, and Sabrina remembers seeing the firefighters return to the engines when they had done their work. One of the firefighters removed her helmet on the rig, and Sabrina saw a woman! Sabrina looked at her mom and said. "I want to do that!" She told her mom she wanted to be a "Fire fire." Ever since that day, Sabrina has been inspired to be a firefighter and rescue medic.

After graduating from Citrus Valley High School in Redlands, Sabrina began attending Crafton, determined to reach her goal. She was forced to take a break after two semesters because of financial difficulties. She spent a year working at Baker's Drive-Thru to earn the funds

that allowed her to continue her path to her goal at Crafton. Not having a support system at home, Sabrina is grateful to retired EMT faculty member Gary Reece for taking her under his wing and encouraging her to apply for a scholarship. Sa-

brina handwrote her scholarship application, not expecting to be a recipient. To her surprise, she received the Charles J.C. Kean Memorial Scholarship, which

enabled her to pursue her dream at Crafton. She is currently enrolled in a Fire Tech class as well as a Kinesiology class to prepare her for the physical rigors of the CHC Fire Academy.

Obstacles and seemingly insurmountable challenges are not stopping Sabrina, because she doesn't own a computer, she spends time using computers at the College. Sabrina also assists her family and her girlfriend with expenses. She is working for an Orange County ambulance company as many hours as she can. Sabrina's girlfriend is also an EMT, and whom she met through work.

Her struggles continue. While working a call at the Honda Center in Anaheim, her girlfriend fell on the ice while retrieving an equipment bag and suffered a concussion. The resulting MRI revealed a colloid cyst in her brain. The couple is now making payments for the needed treatments to avoid further complications.

Women are in the minority in the CHC Fire Academy. "That makes me want to work harder," said Sabrina. "I want to take women under my wing. We can support each

> other without judgment and work on our flaws." Sabrina wants the women at the CHC Fire Academy to work together and not be competitive with each other.

"I'm not here to be better than you, I'm here to be better for myself:" Sabrina said. When asked how she handles the difficulties of being teased for being in the minority, Sabrina replied, "I stopped caring because I started loving myself."

She explained the rigor and difficulty of the 16-week program and expressed her appreciation to the preceptors from American Medical Response and Cal Fire, who provided field opportunities for Crafton students. Each of the four cohorts provided comments.

The first of the class speakers, Cristian Serrano, thanked the audience

on behalf of his class for being their support system and specifically thanked his mom, saying, "All that I was, all that I am, and all that I will become, I owe to her. So thank you, I love you, Mom." A second class speaker, Jonathan Castaneda, expressed his appreciation to his classmates for the study groups, commenting, "As a class, we bonded and became a family; I will never forget the knowledge and memories I've made this semester."

The event concluded with comments by faculty members, recognition of each graduate, and an announcement that eleven of the students have already passed the National Registry exam and are ready to be certified in California to work as emergency medical technicians.

Justine Galvan is a current student in the Crafton Hills College Paramedic Program. She is serving her internship with San Bernardino County Fire. A few weeks ago she was part of the team that responded to a 911 call for a man who was in cardiac arrest (not breathing with no pulse). Using the tools and knowledge she had gained from the CHC Paramedic Program, Justine was able to revive the man.

At a recent council meeting, Justine and her preceptors were recognized by the Hesperia City Council and ICEMA (Inland Counties Emergency Medical Agency -- the local governing authority that oversees emergency medical services in the inland area). Justine was also able to meet and shake hands with the man she revived.





"Although Justine's actions that day are the same actions that every student performs in their duties, the opportunity to shake the hand of the person she saved is extremely special," said Amanda Ward, CHC Professor and Field Coordinator for the CHC paramedic program.

Well done, Justine. You make us proud.

Medical Director Dr. Roger Seheult applauded the Crafton Hills College program for being the most decorated Sputum Bowl champions in the country, adding that our graduates are part of an esteemed group and well respected in the

field. The Sputum Bowl is a knowledge competition for respiratory care students.

Program Director Michael Sheahan explained the difficulty of content and requirements for the program. He said that a usual course load for a full-time student would be 12-15 units but that students in

this program take up to 29.5 units per semester. He thanked the students for their dedication and acknowledged their

skills as they move into the field. "You are no longer students; you are now colleagues and friends," Sheahan said.

Class speaker, Andrew Sanders, who was chosen by his classmates to provide a message on their behalf, explained that most

people take breathing for granted. "We don't think about breathing until we can't," said Sanders. He encouraged his class to be useful, compassionate, and nurture your patients.
