How did the "going gradeless" approach help your learning? (N=7)
Because I did not know what my grade was in the class or how well I was doing, it motivated me to always be doing better and trying to make my progress visible in every video. It was stressful at times to not know what my grades were or how I did on certain assignments.
Going gradeless was more focused on learning than looking for an grade throughout the semester
In a way it takes away the stress of grades themselves.
It allowed me to focus more on the subject rather than just focusing on the grade.
It helped me want to get better and learn from my feedback because I would have to meet with the teacher and prove my progress. It also kinda showed me that the teacher cares about our learning, not our grades.
The final grade would be based on how I improved on my skills, how well I applied the skills, and how well I did overall.
There was more focus on learning than looking for a grade during the course

Why did the "going gradeless" approach not help your learning? (N=1)
It was difficult to gauge how I did along the way, even with feedback. Even though this concept is designed to help the student focus on improvement rather than their letter grades. How do you feel "going gradeless" on individual assignments affected your overall effort in the course? (N=4)
I feel that it was weird to start out with, as I'm not used to having to not worry about my grades, so it feels a little hard to adjust to, but I also feel that it is a better way to go about school. It focuses more on how you learn rather than get a good grade and pass.
I feel that knowing my grade motivated me to always be showing progress and that I am learning and understanding what I am learning. I had tons of feedback to go off of and that directed me to where I should be showing improvement. If there is no feedback from peers or especially the instructor I do not think this "going gradeless" system would be as effective. Having feedback on individual assignments helped me know what need improving for future assignments since I had no grades to go off of.
I was able to get the work done in a somewhat timely manner, but I was mostly getting the assignments turned in the day they were due, not necessarily before the due date.
Now on this one (specifically regarding individual assignments)-- yes I felt less pressure in that if I did something wrong, I could focus on learning how to fix it rather than my grade suffering and I'm all stressed about raising that grade even though I figured out the mistake and worked through it. There is something to be said about a student being able to demonstrate their progress with a demonstration language and this going gradeless on individual assignments made me feel free to choose the harder of the assignment choices (for example if we had different sentences to choose from to sin-- I felt free to choose the more difficult one because I knew I was safe to work through my mistakes

The feeling that as a student the focus is the student's education and improvement. You will never fool a student when it comes to the dedication of a teacher. I liked the concept and genuinely feel with a few adjustments it could be even better for everyone.
You actually have to want to get better and learn something out of the class. The teacher cares about your learning and well-being and not a number on a screen.

What is the worst thing about "gradeless" learning? (N=8)
For certain people it can be stressful because you want to know your grade. You can also feel behind if you don't see progress, but that is just me.
I don't have a clear idea of how I'm doing throughout the class; only at the end of class do I have an idea of how I did overall.
I think the worst thing about "gradeless" learning is that I can't see a grade. For me individually, it helps me process how I am doing in the class and not having that is stressful for me. I understand the whole point of "going gradeless" is not having grades throughout the class :) I had outstanding feedback throughout my class which helped tremendously. Without feedback though, I do not think "gradeless" learning would work.
