>>> Computer Science Club <<<

Tied by our interests to pursue the field of engineering through the utilization of programming - both conceptual and practical - our club was established to help ourselves and others improve in our ability to build and execute efficient solutions to problems. We re-chartered the club during early October, not long before Crafton's first club rush during the fall semester.

Currently, our meetings consist of creating algorithmic solutions to problem sets most commonly seen in interview questions for candidates looking to obtain a position in the tech world. Due to recent certainties regarding the pandemic, we are currently limited to only zoom meetings, however, if an opportunity arises in the future we are planning to organize in-person meetings at the Crafton library.

In a typical meeting, we would choose specific programming questions, construct solutions as both groups and individuals, and then showcase our solutions and methods to the group at the end of the meeting. This way, we are able to foster collaboration (highly common in engineering jobs), share new methods of problem-solving, and create soft skills through presenting.

Each problem set question is presented and evaluated based on how efficiently the solution is built. When coming up with a solution, some members code their solutions, while others verbally explain how the solution is reached. This means that there are no programming requirements! Anyone is free to join.

Currently we have about ten members, mostly pursuing a major in STEM - more specifically Computer Science.

We even have a mobile food bank called <u>Living On The Streets</u> that goes out to the homeless in the Inland Empire. We feed more than 1000 people every day, from Fontana to Calimesa, and even in the mountain communities, like Big Bear, Lake Arrowhead, and Forest Falls. That takes a lot of people power!"


Judy Cannon: I was an English major. Over the winter break I spent time with my husband, kids, and grandkids (and grand-dog) in Utah.
