Instruction Suspended Because of Fires

Just about the time we were getting used to the campus being closed because of COVID, the El Dorado Fire erupted in our local mountains and led to suspension of even our remote instruction from Tuesday, September 8 through Thursday, September 10.

Crafton Hills College President Kevin Horan pointed out that while the Crafton campus itself was not threatened, many of our students and faculty members were placed under added stress because of mandatory evacuations or living under an evacuation warning with the looming possibility they would need to leave their homes. The decision to close the campus during the wide spread mandatory evacuations was determined to be the best and safest course of action to support the college community.

Honors students Matt and Brystal Nevins were forced to evacuate from their home just east of Bryant Street for four days. "Evacuation is not just physically but also emotional exhausting," noted Brystal. "I'm a planner and not having any idea of when we could come back had me constantly on edge." She and her husband Matt did get updates on the status of their home, but she said there was the real possibility it might burn down. Luckily, it survived.

In contrast, Daniel McCluskey, another Honors student who lives on the other side of Bryant Street was not evacuated. "The experience was still quite frightening," according to Daniel, whose neighborhood was under evacuation warning. "It was definitely a distraction. We had to be ready to leave at a moment's notice. The anticipation and fear of evacuation was definitely on my mind more than my schoolwork!"

Brystal agreed that schoolwork was not the first thing on her mind. "My mental energy was spent being inside a small room with two large dogs and keeping an anxious dog calm. Schoolwork took a back seat."

Thank you to the Crafton administration who made the well-being of our students and staff a priority.
