2025-2026 CALIFORNIA GENERAL EDUCATION TRANSFER CURRICULUM (Cal-GETC)

MET / IP / NEED	Completion of the California General Education Transfer Curriculum (Cal-GETC) will permit a student to transfer from a California Community College (CCC) to a California State University (CSU) campus or a University of California (UC) campus or program generally without the need, after transfer, to take additional lower-division general education courses. All courses must be completed with a "C" or better. ("C-" grades are not acceptable.)
	Students should request Cal-GETC certification with Admissions & Records when requesting their final transcripts to be sent to the UC or CSU campus of their choice during the final term before transfer.
	CSU: Students who have maintained continuous enrollment at a California Community College or CSU or combination of the two that started before Fall 2025 may use the previous pattern, (CSUGE). Please see www.assist.org and talk with a Counselor.
	UC: Entering UC transfer students may follow the IGETC Standards version current to when they began at a CCC, any subsequent version, or Cal-GETC. This policy applies to any CCC transfer student regardless of continuous enrollment.
	CAUTION: Cal-GETC may not be the best option for transfer, particularly for majors such as Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Computer Science, Engineering and Math. Consult with a counselor for more details.
	NOTE: COMM, POLS, and PSYC courses on this form were formerly known as COMMST, POLIT, and PSYCH, respectively, prior to Fall 2025.
