



The majority response from six hundred and eight students was for CHC to focus on associate degrees and transfer preparation (81%). The discussion in the emergency Academic Senate meeting came to the same conclusion. Of course, this doesn't mean that only basic skills and developmental classes and certificates will be cut. It does mean, however, that making the decision to cut roughly two hundred classes is going to be even more difficult this time around. 
