Proofreading for Run-ons and Comma Splices

Goal: This Directed Learning Activity is intended to introduce you to proofreading for run-ons and comma splices, and will help you become familiar with terms, definitions and applications of the concepts surrounding the topic.

Activities: This portion of the Directed Learning Activity is meant to be done independently. This portion will include activities such as exercises, games, Power Point presentations, and/or other lessons that show applications of the topic. Keep in mind that for this exercise, you're *creating errors* that you normally wouldn't want to make in writing, but creating the error will help you understand how comma splices and run-ons are constructed so that you will be able to spot them in your own writing more easily. Bring in the original article when you meet with a tutor, but below, just write the comma splices or run-ons that you've created.
