Researching II: Academic Databases

Goal: This Directed Learning Activity is intended to introduce you toconducting research using academic databases as opposed to search engines, and will help you become familiar with terms, definitions and applications of the concepts surrounding the topic. If you would like to start by learning how to conduct research using search engines, refer to the Directed Learning Activity, "Researching I."

Activities: This portion of the Directed Learning Activity is meant to be done independently. This portion will include activities such as exercises, games, Power Point presentations, and/or other lessons that show applications of the topic. You should print all materials used and take notes on anything you learn in this Directed Learning Activity.

Before you begin researching, you will need to gain access to academic databases. You can begin
your research using search engines, however, this should not be the way you attain the
information you will ultimately use. Search engines may help you discover key words to expand
your search further. An academic database is a collection of credible resource materials that can
be used in college level research writing.

At Crafton Hills Community College, you may obtain your database card at the reference desk on the first floor of the library. At any other school you attend in the future, you will also likely be able to obtain a database card at the school's library. For your first Activity, you will need to obtain a database card.

2. Now, you will need to learn how to use the database card. Fortunately, your database card should contain instructions for reaching the databases. For Crafton Hills Community College students, the steps are available. In this Activity, you must follow the steps.

If you are a student at another school, the steps are likely very similar; however, if it is difficult to find the databases, you should ask someone at the reference desk in your school's library, as the steps may be different.

If you are using the databases from a computer at your school, the passwords are likely already entered, but if you are conducting your research from your own computer, you will need to enter the passwords yourself. For Crafton Hills Community College students, these passwords are available to you on the database card. Other schools may have different methods for logging in to the academic databases. For this information, ask someone at the reference desk at your school's library.

3. In this Activity, you will learn about some of the technical aspects regarding research. You will read a document about Boolean Connectors, and will learn how to put them to use in conducting your research. These Boolean Connectors may be used in the academic databases, as well as in the search engines.
