Times New Roman, 12pt font, and left aligned. Most professors go by Professor and their last name, but some may ask that you address them as Doctor.

Title is centered and major content words are capitalized. Words like a, an, and the are only capitalized if they are the first words of the title.

Font and Spacing: Double spaced throughout. Times New Roman 12pt font.

On the top of page, below the header, aligned to the left, list the following:

The title should be centered and most major content words should be capitalized except short

words and articles like a, an, and the unless they are the first words in the title.



Setting Up Works Cited:

Works Cited should be centered in 12pt Times New Roman font.

Entries should be listed alphabetically by last name.

For an entry, every line that goes beyond the first line should be indented by .5 (hanging indent).

Basic format for an article:

Last Name, First Name. "Title of Article." Name of Publication, volume numbers or editions,

date of publication, page numbers, URL or DOI. Include an access date if the publication

date is not available.
