BP 4000 INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAMS

(Replaces current SBCCD BP 4000)

From current SBCCD BP 4000 titled Instructional Programs

A. Programs

The colleges of the District shall offer comprehensive instructional programs in the areas of general education, transfer education, vocational education, learning skills education, community services, and joint programs with business, industry, labor, government, and other accredited educational institutions.

B. Degrees

The colleges shall offer programs of instruction leading to the Associate in Arts Degree and/or the Associate in Science Degree. Degree programs shall meet State requirements for such degrees. Each college shall publish the requirements for the degrees offered in its college catalog.

C. Certificates

The colleges shall offer programs leading to a Certificate of Completion in fields of study or training where such certificates are appropriate.

D. Approval

- Courses, degrees, and certificate programs require Board approval and approval by the State Chancellor's Office.

(2) Establish policies for and approve courses of instruction and educational
programs. The educational programs shall be submitted to the board of
governors for approval. Courses of instruction that are not offered in approved
educational programs shall be submitted to the board of governors for approval.
The governing board shall establish policies for, and approve, individual courses
that are offered in approved educational programs, without referral to the board
of governors.

(3) Establish academic standards, probation and dismissal and readmission
policies, and graduation requirements not inconsistent with the minimum
standards adopted by the board of governors.

(4) Employ and assign all personnel not inconsistent with the minimum
standards adopted by the board of governors and establish employment
practices, salaries, and benefits for all employees not inconsistent with the laws
of this state.

98 (5) To the extent authorized by law, determine and control the district's
99 operational and capital outlay budgets. The district governing board shall
100 determine the need for elections for override tax levies and bond measures and
101 request that those elections be called.

(6) Manage and control district property. The governing board may contract forthe procurement of goods and services as authorized by law.

(7) Establish procedures that are consistent with minimum standards
established by the board of governors to ensure faculty, staff, and students the
opportunity to express their opinions at the campus level, to ensure that these
opinions are given every reasonable consideration, to ensure the right to
participate effectively in district and college governance, and to ensure the right
of academic senates to assume primary responsibility for making

recommendations in the areas of curriculum and academic standards.

111 (8) Establish rules and regulations governing student conduct.

(9) Establish student fees as it is required to establish by law, and, in itsdiscretion, fees as it is authorized to establish by law.

(10) In its discretion, receive and administer gifts, grants, and scholarships.

(11) Provide auxiliary services as deemed necessary to achieve the purposes ofthe community college.

(12) Within the framework provided by law, determine the district's academiccalendar, including the holidays it will observe.

(13) Hold and convey property for the use and benefit of the district. The 119 governing board may acquire by eminent domain any property necessary to 120 carry out the powers or functions of the district. 121 (14) Participate in the consultation process established by the board of 122 governors for the development and review of policy proposals. 123 (c) In carrying out the powers and duties specified in subdivision (b) or other 124 provisions of statute, the governing board of each community college district 125 shall have full authority to adopt rules and regulations, not inconsistent with the 126 regulations of the board of governors and the laws of this state, that are 127 necessary and proper to executing these prescribed functions. 128 (d) Wherever in this section or any other statute a power is vested in the 129 governing board, the governing board of a community college district, by 130 majority vote, may adopt a rule delegating the power to the district's chief 131 executive officer or any other employee or committee as the governing board 132 may designate. However, the governing board shall not delegate any power that 133 is expressly made nondelegable by statute. (a) Within six months of the formation of a community college district, the governing board shall
adopt and carry out its policies for the establishment, modification, or discontinuance of courses
or programs. Such policies shall incorporate statutory responsibilities regarding vocational or
occupational training program review as specified in section 78016 of the Education Code.
(b) Within six months of the formation of a community college district, the governing board shall
adopt and carry out its policies and procedures to provide that its courses and programs are

§ 55061. Philosophy and Criteria for Associate Degree and General Education.

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(a) The governing board of a community college district shall adopt a policy which states its
 specific philosophy on General Education. In developing this policy governing boards shall
 consider the following policy of the Board of Governors:

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The awarding of an Associate Degree is intended to represent more than an accumulation of 205 206 units. It is to symbolize a successful attempt on the part of the college to lead students through patterns of learning experiences designed to develop certain capabilities and insights. Among 207 these are the ability to think and to communicate clearly and effectively both orally and in 208 writing; to use mathematics; to understand the modes of inquiry of the major disciplines; to be 209 aware of other cultures and times; to achieve insights gained through experience in thinking 210 about ethical problems; and to develop the capacity for self-understanding. In addition to these 211 212 accomplishments, the student shall possess sufficient depth in some field of knowledge to contribute to lifetime interest. 213

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Central to an Associate Degree, General Education is designed to introduce students to the
variety of means through which people comprehend the modern world. It reflects the conviction
of colleges that those who receive their degrees must possess in common certain basic
principles, concepts and methodologies both unique to and shared by the various disciplines.

- 219 College educated persons must be able to use this knowledge when evaluating and 220 appreciating the physical environment, the culture, and the society in which they live. Most
- appreciating the physical environment, the culture, and the society in which they live. N
 importantly, General Education should lead to better self-understanding.
- In establishing or modifying a general education program, ways shall be sought to create
 coherence and integration among the separate requirements. It is also desirable that general
 education programs involve students actively in examining values inherent in proposed
 solutions to major social problems.

- (b) The governing board of a community college district shall also establish criteria to determine
 which courses may be used in implementing its philosophy on the associate degree and general
 education.
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(c) The governing board of a community college district shall, on a regular basis, review the
 policy and criteria established pursuant to subdivisions (a) and (b) of this section.

- § 55062. Types of Courses Appropriate to the Associate Degree.

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The criteria established by the governing board of a community college district to implement its philosophy on the associate degree shall permit only courses that conform to the standards

specified in section 55002(a) and that fall into the following categories to be offered as degree-247 applicable credit courses: 248 (a) All lower division courses accepted toward the baccalaureate degree by the California State 249 University or University of California or designed to be offered for transfer. 250 251 (b) Courses that apply to the major or area of emphasis in non-baccalaureate career technical 252 253 fields. 254 255 (c) English composition courses not more than one level below the first transfer level composition course, typically known as Freshman Composition. Each student may count only 256 one English composition course below transfer level for credit toward the associate degree. 257 English as a Second Language (ESL) courses which teach composition skills are not 258 259 considered to be English composition courses for purposes of this subdivision. 260 (d) All mathematics courses above and including Elementary Algebra. 261 262 (e) Credit courses in English and mathematics taught in or on behalf of other departments and 263 which, as determined by the local governing board require entrance skills at a level equivalent to 264 those necessary for the courses specified in subdivisions (c) and (d) above. 265 266 Note: Authority cited: Sections 66700 and 70901, Education Code. Minimum Requirements for the Associate Degree. 277 The governing board of a community college district shall confer the associate degree upon a 278 279 student who has demonstrated competence in reading, in written expression, and in mathematics, and who has satisfactorily completed at least 60 semester units or 90 quarter 280 units of degree-applicable credit course work (as defined in section 55002(a)) which falls into 281 282 the categories described in section 55062. A college may also accept toward satisfaction of this requirement courses that were not completed at a California community college that would 283 reasonably be expected to meet or exceed the standards of section 55002(a). 284 Effective for all students admitted to a community college for the Fall 2009 term or any term 285 thereafter, competence in written expression shall be demonstrated by obtaining a satisfactory 286 grade in an English course at the level of the course typically known as Freshman Composition 287 (either Freshman Composition or another English course at the same level and with the same 288 289 rigor, approved locally) or by completing an assessment conducted pursuant to subchapter 6 of this chapter (commencing with section 55500) and achieving a score determined to be 290 comparable to satisfactory completion of the specified English course. Satisfactory completion 291 of an English course at the level of Freshman Composition shall satisfy both this competency 292 requirement and the coursework requirement set forth in subdivision (b)(1)(D)(i) of this section. 293

- 294 Effective for all students admitted to a community college for the Fall 2009 term or any term
- thereafter, competence in mathematics shall be demonstrated by obtaining a satisfactory grade
- in a mathematics course at the level of the course typically known as Intermediate Algebra
- 297 (either Intermediate Algebra or another mathematics course at the same level, with the same 298 rigor and with Elementary Algebra as a prerequisite, approved locally) or by completing an
- assessment conducted pursuant to subchapter 6 of this chapter (commencing with section
- 300 55500) and achieving a score determined to be comparable to satisfactory completion of the
- 301 specified mathematics course. Satisfactory completion of a mathematics course at the level of
- 302 Intermediate Algebra shall satisfy both this competency requirement and the coursework
- requirement set forth in subdivision (b)(1)(D)(ii) of this section.
- The competency requirements for written expression and mathematics may also be met by obtaining a satisfactory grade in courses in English and mathematics taught in or on behalf of
- other departments and which, as determined by the local governing board, require entrance
- skills at a level equivalent to those necessary for Freshman Composition and Intermediate
 Algebra respectively. Requirements for demonstrating competency in reading shall be locally
- 309 determined.
- 310 The required 60 semester or 90 quarter units of course work must be fulfilled in a curriculum
- accepted toward the degree by a college within the district (as shown in its catalog). It must
- include at least 18 semester or 27 quarter units in general education and at least 18 semester or
- 27 quarter units in a major or area of emphasis as prescribed in this section. Of the total
- required units, at least 12 semester or 18 quarter units must be completed in residence at the
- college granting the degree. Exceptions to residence requirements for the associate degree
- 316 may be made by the governing board when it determines that an injustice or undue hardship
- 317 would be placed on the student.
- 318 (a) Requirements for a major or area of emphasis.

(1) At least 18 semester or 27 quarter units of study must be taken in a single discipline or related disciplines, as listed in the community colleges "Taxonomy of Programs," or in an area of emphasis involving lower division coursework which prepares students for a field of study or for a specific major at the University of California or the California State University.

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(2) Effective for all students admitted to a community college for the Fall 2009 term or any term thereafter, each course counted toward the unit requirement of this subdivision must be completed with a grade of C or better or a "P" if the course is taken on a "pass-no pass" basis.

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321 (b) General Education Requirements.

(1) Students receiving an associate degree shall complete a minimum of 18 semester or 27 quarter units of general education coursework which includes a minimum of three semester or four quarter units in each of the areas specified in paragraphs (A), (B) and (C) and the same minimum in each part of paragraph (D). The remainder of the unit requirement is also to be selected from among these four divisions of learning or as determined by local option:

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(A) Natural Sciences. Courses in the natural sciences are those which examine the physical universe, its life forms, and its natural phenomena. To satisfy the general education requirement in natural sciences, a course shall be designed to help the student develop an appreciation and understanding of the scientific method, and encourage an understanding of the relationships between science and other human activities. This

category would include introductory or integrative courses in astronomy, biology, chemistry, general physical science, geology, meteorology, oceanography, physical geography, physical anthropology, physics and other scientific disciplines.

(B) Social and Behavioral Sciences. Courses in the social and behavioral sciences are those which focus on people as members of society. To satisfy the general education requirement in social and behavioral sciences, a course shall be designed to develop an awareness of the method of inquiry used by the social and behavioral sciences. It shall be designed to stimulate critical thinking about the ways people act and have acted in response to their societies and should promote appreciation of how societies and social subgroups operate. This category would include introductory or integrative survey courses in cultural anthropology, cultural geography, economics, history, political science, psychology, sociology and related disciplines.

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(C) Humanities. Courses in the humanities are those which study the cultural activities and artistic expressions of human beings. To satisfy the general education requirement in the humanities, a course shall be designed to help the student develop an awareness of the ways in which people throughout the ages and in different cultures have responded to themselves and the world around them in artistic and cultural creation and help the student develop aesthetic understanding and an ability to make value judgments. Such courses could include introductory or integrative courses in the arts, foreign languages, literature, philosophy, and religion.

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(D) Language and Rationality. Courses in language and rationality are those which develop for the student the principles and applications of language toward logical thought, clear and precise expression and critical evaluation of communication in whatever symbol system the student uses. Such courses include:

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(i) English Composition. Courses fulfilling the written composition requirement shall be designed to include both expository and argumentative writing.

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(ii) Communication and Analytical Thinking. Courses fulfilling the communication and analytical thinking requirement include oral communication, mathematics, logic, statistics, computer languages and programming, and related disciplines.

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(3) Ethnic Studies will be offered in at least one of the areas required by subdivision (2).

(c) While a course might satisfy more than one general education requirement, it may not be counted more than once for these purposes. A course may be used to satisfy both a general education requirement and a major or area of emphasis requirement. Whether it may be counted again for a different degree requirement is a matter for each college to determine. Students may use the same course to meet a general education requirement for the associate degree and to partially satisfy a general education requirement at the California State University, if such course is accepted by that system to satisfy a general education requirement.

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(d) For the purpose of this section, "satisfactorily completed" means either credit earned on a "pass-no pass" basis or a grade point average of 2.0 or better in community college credit courses in the curriculum upon which the degree is based. 331 Note: Authority cited: Sections 66700 and 70901, Education Code. Credit Certificates. 359 (a) Any sequence of courses consisting of 18 or more semester units or 27 or more guarter 360 units of degree-applicable credit coursework shall constitute an educational program subject to 361 approval by the Chancellor pursuant to section 55130. The college-awarded document 362 confirming that a student has completed such a program shall be known as a certificate of 363 achievement and may not be given any other designation. The award of a certificate of 364 achievement is intended to represent more than an accumulation of units. Listing of the 365 366 certificate of achievement on a student transcript symbolizes successful completion of patterns of learning experiences designed to develop certain capabilities that may be oriented to career 367 or general education. For purposes of this subdivision, the term "general education" includes 368 coursework taken to satisfy transfer patterns established by the University of California, the 369

California State University, or accredited public postsecondary institutions in adjacent states
 which award the baccalaureate degree.

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373 (b) Shorter credit programs leading to a certificate may be established without review and approval by the Chancellor after approval by the college curriculum committee and the district 374 governing board. Such a certificate may be given any name or designation deemed appropriate 375 376 by the district governing board, except that such a certificate may not be referred to as a certificate of achievement, a certificate of completion, or a certificate of competency, unless 377 approved by the Chancellor pursuant to subdivision (c). Such a certificate may not be listed on a 378 379 student's transcript, unless approved by the Chancellor pursuant to subdivision (c). 380 (c) A district may submit any sequence of courses consisting of 12 or more semester units or 18 381 382 or more quarter units of degree-applicable credit coursework to the Chancellor and request that it be approved as a program leading to a certificate of achievement. The Chancellor may 383 approve such a program if he or she determines that it satisfies the requirements of subdivision 384 (a) despite requiring fewer than 18 semester or 27 guarter units of degree-applicable credit 385 coursework. 386 387 (d) Content and assessment standards for certificates shall be defined by the local curriculum 388 389 committee and comply with the requirements of this chapter. 440	(2) the district submits a certification by September 30th of each year verifying that the persons who will serve on the curriculum committee and others who will be involved in the curriculum approval process at each college within the district for that academic year have received training consistent with guidelines prescribed by the Chancellor on the review and approval of courses not part of educational programs;
441	(3) no course which has previously been denied separate approval by the Chancellor or is part of a program that has been disapproved by the Chancellor may be offered pursuant to this subdivision unless the proposed course has been modified to adequately address the reasons for denial and has been subsequently reapproved by the college curriculum committee and district governing board;
442	(4) no group of courses approved pursuant to this subdivision which total 18 or more semester units or 27 or more quarter units in a single four-digit Taxonomy of Programs code may be linked to one another by means of prerequisites or corequisites;

(5) no student may be permitted to count 18 or more semester units or 27 or more quarter units of coursework approved pursuant to this subdivision toward satisfying the requirements for a certificate or other document evidencing completion of an educational program or towards a major or area of emphasis for completion of an associate degree; and

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(6) the district promptly reports all courses approved pursuant to this subdivision to the Chancellor through the Chancellor's Office Management Information System.

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(c) The Chancellor may, at any time, terminate the ability of a district to offer courses pursuant
to subdivision (b) if he or she determines that a district has failed to comply with all of the
conditions set forth in that subdivision. In that event, the district will become immediately subject
to the requirements of subdivision (d).

(d) Effective January 1, 2013, or earlier if so required by subdivision (c), the governing board of
 each community college district shall separately submit for approval by the Chancellor all
 nondegree-applicable credit courses and individual degree-applicable credit courses which are
 not part of any approved educational program.
