8. Need for the Course:

Throughout history, and particularly in the last century, events in the Middle East have clearly demonstrated the need for a more global understanding of the language and culture of the region. Arabic is the primary language of more than 300 million people and is the liturgical communicative medium for 1.2 billion Muslims around the globe. By providing instruction in Arabic language and culture, ARABIC 101 will help fulfill the critical need to understand the language and complexity of the Arab world and its economic and socio-political significance to the United States while at the same time expanding the foreign language offerings at the college. This course is associate degree applicable and transfers to CSU and UC.

- 8. demonstrate knowledge of basic grammatical structures in an effort to read, write, speak and listen in Arabic at a beginning level
- 9. write simple phrases and sentences in Arabic
- 10. read short passages from books and newspapers in Arabic
- 11. describe and appreciate aspects of Arab culture including history, daily life, personal roles, education and customs and folkways
- 12. describe significant events in the history of the Middle East up to 300 BCE
