International Program Update –	SBCCD does not have an International Program at	
Dr. Glen Kuck	this time. Currently there are 9 international students at Crafton and 30 at SBVC. The largest	
	group is from Vietnam and they are majoring in all	
	subjects. We are not currently providing additional	
	services for these students. CSUSB has 1,100	
	international students.	
	The State Chancellor and universities have started a	
	2+2 model to incorporate community colleges as a	
	pathway. Some countries limit the money given to	
	students and this enables them to complete their degree within that allotment. They achieve more	
	support, smaller classes, assimilate, and have higher	
	success rates. Here the average is \$6,000 per year	
	and at CSU it is \$15,500.00 and at UC it is \$37,700	
	approximately.	
	This is Contract Ed (not apportioned revenue). It	
	allows us to buy additional sections and pay for	
	instructors and if the classes are not full, we can	
	offer to all students.	
	The model discussed was Butte College in Oroville,	
	CA. It took five years to grow their program. They	
	currently have 200 international students. They	

	started small and focused on quality education.They stated the break-even point is 100-150 students.Glen indicated the next steps include a collective committee district wide to decide if we want to pursue this. Possibly start at the District since not enough students to establish a program. Once large enough, transition to the colleges. We need	
	compliance with SEEVIS by incorporating an orientation program and support structures. Glen asked for feedback and is going out to both campuses to share this background information.

	Will include outreach programs for Hispanic students in high school, junior high and elementary schools; parent outreach activities; and mentoring and academic coaching program by possibly incorporating Summer Bridge, Master Students, First- Year Experience and Learning Communities.
