Counseling Redesign Presentation – Mariana Macamay and Jimmy Grabow	Mariana and Jimmy shared Transforming the Tri-Centers: A University Transfer Center, Career Center and Counseling Center initiative. They are creating a new collaborative approach for student success. They have identified some gaps and this project is to eliminate those gaps. • After 6 years of continuous enrollment at California Community Colleges only 40% of transfer seeking students actually transfer. • Problems trying to solve at CHC: ➤ In February 2021 we had over 1200 students that were within 3 units of completing a degree or certificate but had not applied for their degree ➤ We have 1900 plus students with 30+ units yet only about 600 transfer annually ➤ We have over 500 students with 60+ transferable units currently enrolled − Why? • Solutions they have come up with: ➤ Create a structured approach to meet with students from enrollment to graduation/transfer ➤ Meaningful contacts based on unit completion with milestone completion markers of 1-14, 15-29, 30-44, 45-60+. ➤ Want to have at least 80% of our students to have a SEP (Student Educational Plan)

Safety Committee Recommendations RE Covid-19 Guidelines - Mike	Safety committee reviewed the questions that came up from the re-opening work group that were difficult to answer. They developed the following recommendation to the Crafton Council Regarding the Evolution of the COVID-19 pandemic on 4-11-22:	
	 Base SBCCD's response to the pandemic upon regulatory requirements and current public health guidelines. As guidelines evolve, District directions should evolve accordingly. Based upon the relaxing of pandemic- driven safety measures, we recommend reversing the implementation of the student vaccine mandate and allow for optional masking. 	
	 Monitor the San Bernardino County Covid-19 dashboard and Department of Public Health guidelines for changes. Revise directions as necessary. 	
	 Maintain online course offerings and services to the extent possible for those not yet comfortable with in- person classes and services 	
	 Provide individuals an opportunity to present views on this matter by polling all students and employees to determine the comfort level with this proposed direction. 	
	After creating their recommendations, they received new direction from the District which was to lift the vaccine mandate immediately and indoor masking requirements at the end of May.
