The recommended charge is:</li> <li>The Crafton Council Services as the shared participatory body of the campus. Its charge is to oversee issues related to accreditation; to integrate college plans and to serve as the advisory body to the President on issues of planning and program review and the relationship to resource allocation. The Crafton Council meets bi-monthly.</li> <li>Charge</li> <li>The Crafton Council is the central deliberative collegial body at Crafton Hills College. The primary shared participatory governance committees report to Crafton Council. The fundamental purpose is to provide information and facilitate communication and governance. Brown Act Committee Remote Meeting Option – Kevin	Kevin indicated we have the ability to hold this (Brown Act) meeting remotely due to the extension of AB361 until the end of the calendar year. However, we will be holding this meeting in person for the remainder of this academic year.	
Drop Reason Survey - Keith	Originally the Enrollment Strategies group looked at this because they were looking at data and trying to look at ways we could better support students around dropping. The idea is that we learn the primary reasons why students drop classes. The survey originally only had three options. They added a list of new options. This was taken to several committees including Student Senate for input. One of the most common suggestions was to shorten down the responses. Keith provided the updated list.	
	Brandi asked that they remove Instructor's teaching methods as they are doing a lot more experimental teaching and instructors would be less likely to try experimental teaching methods.	
	When a student decides to drop a class, they are asked the reason why during that drop process. Currently only three choices. They will be able to check as many as they want. Change heading Class Dynamics to Campus Dynamics.	
	Kevin asked that we change financial issues to financial hardship.	
	Keith indicated that this list will be sent to all senate presidents so they can take to their constituent group for review.

Future agenda items	We would like to do a district-wide training around participatory governance. This program is called Collegiality in Action, a joint effort between the Statewide Academic Senate and CCLC covering the intent and processes of AB 1725. It is a one-day facilitated training.	
	In September they will begin to share out their findings to help us and lead the discussions on what those findings are pointing to and what we can do with those findings when crafting our strategic directions and activities for the college. This semester will be pivotal as we should have a working draft by the end of the semester that we can share out with constituency groups.	
Ed Master Plan Overview - Gio	Last spring, we were working with Collaborative Brain Trust and reviewing the environmental scan data, conducting listening sessions with both internal and external stakeholder groups. CTB is now in the process of combining the data gathered from the listening sessions and the internal data and database items.	
	Basic Needs Center: The State Chancellor's Office required all community colleges to open a Basic Needs Center. They have us funding specifically for a Basic Needs Coordinator who help coordinate food insecurities, mental health, financial aid, Cal Fresh, and help us coordinate those support services to students. We just offered that position to Ericka Sherman. She is a community member already working at the County offices. She will start on 08-29-22 and she will be located in Student Life.	
	Two weeks before the semester started, we had a registration assistance center to help students register. These were students who showed up without an appointment. We developed a process to meet with a counselor to select the courses and then go to the registration assistance center to actually help them register for those classes. This was the first time we have done this and it was very successful. They also had answer centers both in person and on-line to help students.	
Outreach and Basic Needs Update - Delmy	Have hired a Director of Outreach and Educational Partnership, Dr. Willie Blackmon; in the process of hiring a full-time coordinator for outreach and also going to be hiring a Senior Student Services Technician.

Kevin is asking the Chancellor to relook at the District's priority list.			
	Keith reported that Gohar Momjian from ACCJC will be here on Thursday to walk around campus. Since our last accreditation visit was virtual, they are required to come to the campus site to verify that we are providing student and instructional services.
