- A survey has been sent out to the campus asking for input on the three software options to replace CurricUNET. The committee will review the results and make a recommendation to the Academic Senate.
- Keith shared a screenshot of the process for selecting a vendor to replace CurricUNET:
 - 1. Identify the members that will participating in the demonstrations.
 - 2. Setup the vendor demonstrations.
 - 3. View and record the demonstrations for those that could not attend.
 - 4. Receive Quotes from Vendors.
 - 5. After the demonstrations, the groups will meet to discuss, review quotes and select the vendors.
 - 6. If both colleges select the same vendor:
 - Luke to review the project with Chancellors Cabinet for approval
 - Luke to work with Larry and Jim to secure funding
 - TESS to include in annual software budget

- 7. If each college selects a separate vendor:
 - Colleges will pay for the software, consulting and integration cost for the project
 - Colleges will include in their annual budget
- 8. Contract is signed
- 9. Andy will work with the vendors to setup the projects
- 10. Project implementation begins
