Essay Assignment: Analysis and Research

Choose a topic and discuss this with the instructor for approval (you <u>must</u> get instructor approval). Students may choose the same topic as that used for their in-class presentation.

- 1. Choose and issue confronting the international community, regional Intra-governmental organizations (e.g., NATO, the European Union), NGO's, or an issue regarding US foreign policy.
- 2. Start with some **background** (history, and recent events) and **justification** (i.e.: Why is this important? Why is there a controversy and/or sharp disagreement over the issue? What can be learned and generalized from looking at this?) for your topic. Consider: Who has a particular stake in this issue, in terms of ideology, partisanship, pragmatic self-interest, etc. Who tends to support one side or the other, and why?
- 3. Present a **detailed analysis at least two sides** of an issue; include further areas of study, utilizing multiple sources (books, articles, websites) that deal with the subject (and that present empirical evidence and arguments).
- 4. Utilizing your additional sources, further explicate each side of the issue. **Include any new developments that need to be discussed**, as well as **any evidence that has recently emerged** to support one side or the other.

5. Include the approaches, constructs and theories from D'Anieri, *International Politics: Power and Purpose in Global Affairs*.

In particular, include analyses from both **the liberalist vs. realist approaches/paradigms** as well as theories/foci under those paradigms that might apply. The alternative approaches of **economic structuralism**, **constructivism**, **and feminism** may also be utilized and discussed.

Also: apply levels of analysis and relevant actors.

Include other areas of relevance (e.g., globalization, nationalism, the environment) where possible.

- 6. After seriously addressing the topic, **include your own opinion** regarding the issue, and explain why you have taken that position.
- Finally, include some prescription (what you think <u>should</u> happen regarding this issue) and some prediction (what you think <u>will</u> happen regarding this issue). You might want to present several possible scenarios of how things might play out.

All papers must be **typed**, **double spaced**, **12-pt Times New Roman**. Please pay attention to proper grammar, spelling and sentence structure. (It is highly recommended that students take advantage of the Tutoring Center in the LRC on-campus.)

All papers **must have proper citation, including endnotes or footnotes**. This includes <u>full and proper citation for internet sources</u>. (Check out Easybib.com or similar useful tools.)

PLEASE USE SUB-HEADINGS!

The instructor is quite willing to meet with students to discuss their topics beforehand. But please **don't wait until the last minute**!

The instructor is quite willing examine rough drafts of papers <u>before the</u> <u>due</u> date (again, don't wait until the last minute!). Please make sure that such rough drafts do not include egregious spelling, grammar or typing errors. (Run Spell-Check ahead of time.)
