# Introduction


The Crafton Hills College (CHC) Office of Resource Development in coordination with the Transfer Center, the HSI STEM grant program, and the Office of Institutional Effectiveness, Research, and Planning (OIERP) developed a survey to measure graduating students' perceptions of CHC, post-award outcomes such as transfer and employment, and interest in alumni services. Information provided by the results will be used to inform the continued improvement of CHC's alumni program and transfer services offered through CHC's Title V and Title III HSI grants.


### Summary of Results

- 98% of respondents either agreed or strongly agreed that their experience as a student at CHC was enriching.
- 94% of respondents either agreed or strongly agreed that if done over, they would choose to attend CHC again.
  - 100% 80% 60% 40% 20% 15% Employed Full-time Employed Part-time Seeking Employment Not Employed
- 67% of respondents were either employed full-time (15%) or part-time (52%).




• 91% of respondents planned to transfer to a four-year institution, and 35% planned to work.







• 63% of respondents planned to transfer to the California State University, and 24% planned to transfer to the University of California.




#### Figure 3. Transfer institutions.

• 81% of respondents identified transfer to a four-year university as their CHC educational goal, and 66% identified obtaining an associate's degree as their CHC educational goal.





- 97% of respondents believe they achieved their CHC educational goal.
- 57% of respondents identified a bachelor's degree as their ultimate educational goal, and 48% of
  respondents identified a graduate degree as their ultimate educational goal.







- 55% of respondents would like to receive additional information about major campus events, and 52% would like to receive additional information about professional development.
- 73% of respondents stated the primary reason for attending alumni events would be to see faculty, and 70% stated the primary reason would be to see classmates.
- Regarding their overall experience at CHC, one respondent stated, "The AAT I am receiving is good for a solid base for my BA."
- One respondent advised new CHC students to "be involved on campus in clubs and student government. Seek opportunities to challenge yourself; push yourself to the limit and you will be your greatest." Another respondent advised, "Never give up. Take Math and English early."

# <u>Methodology</u>

The survey was administered to students attending the Graduate's Breakfast and Transfer Recognition Luncheon in Spring 2014. The survey included four Likert-scale questions which asked respondents' level of agreement with various statements about their experiences at CHC. Eight multiple-choice questions asked for respondents' employment status, plans after graduation from CHC, transfer status, attainment of their CHC educational goal(s), their ultimate educational goal(s), and interest in alumni events. Four open ended questions invited respondents to provide comments regarding their overall experience at CHC, advice to incoming new students, and transfer institution and major. One hundred fifty-six responses were received. Questions shown in tables 2 through 5 and 9 through 11 allowed respondents to select multiple responses, so the sum of percentages equals greater than 100%. The percent (%) in these tables is calculated as the number of responses (#) divided by the total number of responses to the question.

### <u>Findings</u>

Table 1 illustrates respondents' level of agreement with various statements about their experience at CHC. Ninety-eight percent of respondents either agreed or strongly agreed that their experience as a student at CHC was enriching. Additionally, 94% of respondents either agreed or strongly agreed that if done over, they would choose to attend CHC again.

Note: '#' denotes the number of respondents who selected the specific response to each statement, and '%' is the '#' divided by the total number of responses for each statement.

Table 2 illustrates respondents' work status at the time of graduation. Fifty-two percent of respondents were employed part-time, and 20% of respondents were not employed at all. Seventeen percent of respondents were seeking employment, and 16% were employed full-time.

Forty percent of respondents would like to receive additional information about a reunion for their program of study, and an equal number (38%) of respondents would like to receive additional information about a reunion for their program of study, and an equal number (38%) of respondents would like to receive additional information about either community service projects or theatre/art shows.

When asked to provide advice to new students, respondents advised others to persevere, persist, obtain an education plan from counseling, take math early, study, and seek out support services like the tutoring center and the transfer center. One respondent advised, "Be involved on campus in clubs and student government. Seek opportunities to challenge yourself; push yourself to the limit and you will be your greatest." Another respondent advised, "Never give up. Take Math and English early." Respondents provided the following advice:

- 1) Join the Honors Institute-and take their challenges. 2) Use the learning resource center. 3) Sit in front of class!
