

## **Research Brief**

# Spring 2013 Health and Wellness Faculty Evaluation Results

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#### **Purpose of Brief:**

The Health and Wellness Center (HWC) deployed a short online survey amongst Crafton Hills College (CHC) faculty to help improve their center services. A total of 48 faculty members of the college were surveyed and responded to multiple-choice questions about the center's services that occurred during 2011-12.

#### **Summary of Findings:**


- 100% of respondents Strongly Agreed or Agreed that students who are physically and emotionally healthy are better able to pursue their academic goals
- 81% of respondents Strongly Agreed or Agreed that the quality of health education and services in the HWC is a good value to CHC students
- 71% of the respondents Strongly Agreed or Agreed that they inform students about the health services in the Health and Wellness Center
- 65% of the respondents Strongly Agreed or Agreed they announce health education events and new programs to students when they are informed by HWC staff or others
- 42% of the respondents indicated that they referred 7 or more students to the HWC last year

### Methodology

The survey responses were collected between January and May 2013. The faculty were prompted about the health services and announcements on health education and events they inform students about, whether they agreed that students who are physically and emotionally healthy are better able to pursue their educational goals, and if they agreed that the quality of health education and services at the center is valuable to students. Respondents were also asked to rate their level of agreement with four statements about the HWC on a Likert five-point scale, 5=Strongly Agree; 4=Agree; 3=Neutral; 2=Disagree; 1=Strongly Disagree (see Table 1). Respondents also indicated the number of students they referred to the center last year (see Figure 1).
