



This report includes results stemming from the CHC Library Satisfaction Survey disseminated to faculty during the Spring 2021 term. The Office of Institutional Effectiveness, Research and Planning (OIERP) developed this online survey in collaboration with the Library Task Force members.

The survey was organized to collect data on the utilization and satisfaction with library services and resources. Additionally, respondents were asked whether they would like to be contacted about their specific resource needs, email address were provided separately. A total of 55 valid responses were submitted.

Historically, there has never been an active link between instructional faculty and the library staff to discuss how the collection specifically supports the academic programs offered at the college.

I think we need more access to scholarly journals for students, such as Jstor. We have improved, but I think we need to continue to add resources.

Inter library loan program is cumbersome. I tried to get a few books and I remember it wasn't a very friendly process. Whereas my colleague at another college outside our district had a very different and helpful experience. She gave them her list and they requested it for her. She didn't have to figure out and maneuver that process on her own

It would be wonderful if there could be access, even limited access, to JSTOR

Textbooks (course reserves) and books should be circulating at this time either through curbside pick-up or library lockers. There needs to be more appropriation of the budget to fund course reserves so that there is availability of at least 1 textbook for every class. Other campuses do this and it is extremely vital for our students' success. The ILL process needs some re-vamping.

There isn't much to work with or they don't exist.

We need to add robust databases for research

After reviewing the library services/aids available above, what additional resources do you suggest the library provide? (n=13)
Access to Jstor and other peer-reviewed journal subscriptions. Access to more streaming media sources such as Documentary Education Resources (der.org) There are tons of documentaries on that site that would be perfect for social science courses.
Although we don't use the resources in our service area, students share they are extremely satisfied.
Greater consideration for outside inter-library relations. Allowance for students to attend, make use of non SBCCD library options through partnerships.
I don't know how to integrate library resources and would welcome advice.
I said IDK to some of these just because I'm not sure how we are doing it online, such as access to reserves. That may be because I use OERs. Some others I answered IDK because I haven't asked for it, such as faculty resources, except of course the library tour but perhaps by resources, you mean materials? I put Satisfied for in-person tools because I don't know what Libguides is?
I'd love to be able to access JSTOR through the library.
Interlibrary loan would be a great resource. Any chance that we could connect with other Public College/University library systems (e.g. UC Links, CSU, etc) ?

More eBooks and course reserve materials available to the students along with additional databases from Gale and ProQuest that address other disciplines.

Our digital ebooks are not available without subscriptions.

Students could use more guides to use library resources that correlate directly to Course Outline of Record requirements per class aimed at students. For example, they could use more upfront information about critical thinking in various disciplines, more information on how to assess/evaluate sources and evidence for different disciplines, and more accessible information on theories used in different disciplines. It would be great if we have a database of resources that could be come examples of great critical thinking and a pathway for students to follow. I'm not sure if this even exists yet. In addition to information students need to complete reading and writing assignments now, I want my students to become comfortable using library resources to develop their thinking skills for university course subjects and future independent research work. I work to help them see the library as a bridge to understanding how knowledge and theory develops in their disciplines and learn how to find evidence and learn how to understand it. Finally, as some are moving toward no-textbook classes, it would be great if we could refer students to the library to read books and resources for their assignments much as the European model of higher education.
