Fred Smith CHC 2006 Graduate in Anatomy and Physiology



"I love helping people," said Anatomy and Physiology graduate Fred Smith. "Getting into the medical field like my mom and being a nurse practitioner will be a great way to help people."

Smith's mom, Jacqueline, was a CHC graduate in 1998 before transferring to Loma Linda University. She later worked in the emergency room, trauma unit, and intensive care.

"She inspired me at a young age to go into the nursing field," he said. "She took me to work. It seemed fast paced and always interesting."

Smith, 18, was the youngest 2006 graduate. He started taking classes at the college at 15, while attending Redlands East Valley High School.

"At this college, there are plenty of fields allowing you to be a better citizen and person," Smith said. "Crafton has given me the necessary building blocks to achieve a higher level of education. Education is power, and I am strong."

At the CHC 2006 Honors Convocation, which is the college's annual event for recognizing outstanding students, Smith received two scholarships.

"I'm very grateful to the Foundation for these scholarships," he said. "The Foundation scholarships and the Honors Convocation recognize students who have worked hard and put in extra hours to succeed in college. These honors are great encouragement and show us that we're headed in the right direction. It motivates me to work even harder. A university is very expensive, and these scholarships will help."

Smith also thanked his parents for their support in his endeavor. "Being an African American was very motivating to me," Smith said. "To be a distinguished person is very important for my community. There are many stereotypes, and they are not true. Action speaks louder than words."

"I have seen the sacrifices my parents have made for me," Smith said. "My parents have always instilled in me that, with a good education, you can be anybody."

In addition to his educational pursuits, Smith worked as a volunteer with the Ronald McDonald House in Loma Linda. The Ronald McDonald House provides a "home away from home" for families of critically ill children.

Smith is currently continuing his education at Winston-Salem State University in North Carolina.

"Do I have potential to be somebody, to be something?" Melvin Medrina ponders this out loud as he sips his grande cappuccino on a wet Friday afternoon.

On first meeting, 20-year-old Medrina seems polite, laid back, and confident. As he begins to talk about his art, he becomes animated and alive. Suddenly he seems much larger than his 5-foot-6-inch frame. Words and ideas tumble out of his mouth so quickly that his tongue can barely keep pace.

Medrina is an artist.

Growing up in the Philippines, he was surrounded by creative people. He recalls that his house was always full of art and music. In elementary school, Medrina would enter, and win, drawing competitions. Often he would draw using improvised objects such as plants, and chunks of coal, because he did not have the required supplies.

During his later years in high school Medrina's passion for art was temporarily overshadowed by his busy schedule and involvement in other after school activities. That all changed when Medrina and his family moved from the Philippines to Beaumont almost four years ago and he pursued other educational endeavors.

It wasn't until Medrina came to Crafton Hills College in spring 2004 that art would make such a big comeback in his life. "It was sleeping a while, but suddenly, when I came here, it woke up," Medrina said.

Just three classes away from entering the nursing program, he took an art class with instructor Snezana Petrovic. Petrovic introduced herself and struck up a conversation. Medrina was surprised that his instructor was so warm and had taken such an interest in him. "She was my oxygen," Medrina said with a smile.

She helped him explore not just painting, but theatre and performance art.

"I don't know what would happen to me if I never met her," Medrina said. "She is a mentor, a second parent, and a friend."

Life is an inspiration to Medrina. His paintings are about a release of everything, he says. Emotions are what drive him to create.

Medrina also served as vice president of the CHC Arts League, a student art club, in the fall of 2005. He plans to follow in Petrovic's footsteps.

His goal is to earn a master's degree in fine arts, and teach art at the college level.

Both Natalie and Elizabeth, 24, recognized the importance of financial aid with helping them achieve their goal of attending college and being able to earn their associate degrees. "We couldn't have afforded college without it," Natalie said.

"I'm proud of my dad for going through Crafton in such a short time," said Elizabeth, who is considering taking a break, then transferring to a four-year school to major in Spanish and possibly philosophy.

Silas, 25, was also proud of his dad. "It shows that age doesn't make a difference as long as you get it done," he said. "Besides my grandmother, we're the first to graduate in the family."

Jennifer Ference PFF Bank and Trust Network Engineer CHC Alumna -- Classes of '91 and 2005



"Signing up for the Crafton Hills Cisco Academy was the best move I've ever made in my career," said Jennifer Ference, 44, a network engineer for PFF Bank and Trust. "I would encourage anyone interested in getting into the field of networking – particularly Cisco networking – to take CHC's program."

Ference, who had been working 13 years for PFF Bank and Trust and was a network security administrator, decided to return to CHC in 2005 when she saw the college was offering a Cisco Network Academy.

In this era of mass electronic communications, there is an increasing demand for people skilled in the art of designing and implementing computer networks. Networking is the term used to describe the process of connecting one or more computers or devices in order to share resources and information. Networks can be small, such as computers connected within offices, or they can stretch across the planet, such as the Internet.

In conjunction with Cisco Systems Inc., CHC established a Cisco Networking Academy in 2002. Ference completed the Cisco Certified Network Associate (CCNA) program.

"Initially, I went to college to be a more rounded person so I could offer more to my employer," Ference, said. "The Cisco Networking Academy Program gave me the knowledge I needed to become an integral part of the company for which I work."

Ference originally earned an Associate Degree in liberal arts at CHC in 1991. When she entered CHC in the late 80's, her main goal was to complete her Associate Degree.

"I had such a good experience at the college, I didn't want my higher education to end," Ference said. "I enjoyed the classes and learning, so I figured it was an easy step to take two more years at California State University San Bernardino (CSUSB)."

Ference went on to earn a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration with a concentration in Information Management at CSUSB. Later, she returned to CHC to complete the Cisco Academy.

"CHC is an excellent start," said Ference, whose step daughter is currently attending the college. "You can complete your general education courses at a lower cost and get just as good an education as the first two years at a four-year college."

Nick Shipley Business Administration Major



Crafton Hills College Business Administration major Nick Shipley, who served as the CHC Associated Student Body (ASB) vice president of student affairs and external affairs for 2005-2006, was awarded a University of Southern California (USC) grant to attend the USC Marshall School of Business beginning this fall.

The university grant was for more than \$30,000 and will cover most of Shipley's costs to attend USC.

"It means a lot to me," said Shipley, who returned to CHC last year after serving a year in Iraq. "I was worried about debt if I didn't receive assistance.

This means I will be able to start my life immediately after graduating from USC without being overwhelmed by debt."

Shipley, of Redlands, originally began taking courses at CHC in 2002 and, based on his interest in politics, got involved in student government. In addition to serving as the vice president of student affairs, he has served as the ASB president, treasurer, and vice president of external affairs. "It was a good way to get leadership experience," he said.

Prior to attending CHC, Shipley signed up for the National Guard. Veterans Administration benefits helped him afford to attend CHC. "By joining the Army as a part-timer, I was able to serve my country and receive G.I. Bill benefits," he said.

After serving in Iraq, he returned to school. It took him a semester to adjust and get used to going classes, but by spring semester, he was getting straight A's.

At the CHC Honors Convocation in May, he received five scholarships. "Nick is an exceptional student," said CHC Student Services Assistant Carlos Maldonado. "He's one of the best student leaders we've had in three years. He's determined, works hard, and has overcome a tremendous amount of obstacles. On top of that, he was able to be a student leader and contribute to the campus. I think great things will come from Nick Shipley. He'll be somebody."

Shipley expressed excitement about attending USC.

"I feel like all my hard work paid off," he said. "USC is a very prestigious institution. I'm going to get a great education that will propel me to future successes."

Shipley's educational goal is to get a bachelor's degree in business and ultimately earn a master's in business administration. He wants to someday own several small businesses and has thought about future possibilities of running for public office.

"I find it to be an elegant science, and I find nothing more gratifying than teaching the elegance of this science to others," Salt said. "There is nothing more satisfying than seeing a student understand a concept which they thought was beyond them."

Part-time Professor of the Year McClurg has been working as a music instructor and leader of the choir for five years.



Classified staff are the support staff for faculty and administrators. Each year, three classified staff are recognized for outstanding service to the college. CHC's classified staff selected Southerland for her award, and the CHC faculty selected Bruner-Jones and Cao for their awards.

"My goal is to make the assessment process as easy as possible for students," said Southerland, who is an alumna of CHC and remembers what it was like to be a new student. "Students come in and they are nervous about taking the exams. I explain the process, reassure them, and tell them how they will benefit from this."

Southerland also provides students with practice exams so they can prepare and refresh their skills. "A student who is prepared has more confidence," she said. "It alleviates the stress of being in a new environment."

Meanwhile, award recipient Bruner-Jones has worked as a clerical assistant in Teaching Aids for 20 years. Bruner-Jones works in the printing and reproduction office at the college, which includes quick copying, bindery work, laminating, folding, and quality control.

"I don't work directly with the students; however, the work I complete is for the students," Bruner-Jones said. "The copies I run for teachers include course outlines, syllabi, quizzes, exams, and study materials."

"There's lots of pressure to meet deadlines," she said. "The final product must look nice, and it must be accurate. It's important that the work be quality work. I love this."

Fellow employee Cao has worked at CHC for 15 years. "I keep the buildings, classes, and offices clean," Cao said. "It's important to have a clean and comfortable environment so instructors can teach and students can study."

Cao, 60, enjoys working at the college because of the peaceful environment and the friendly people.

"All the people I work with and the instructors are so nice here," he said. "The students here are good students. In 15 years, I've never had a student who was rude."

"I thank all those who presented me with this award," Cao said. "At this age, I try to do my duty at the very best level. I will strive to do even more."


